What is changing?

• From September 2020, Relationships Education and Health Education will become a <u>statutory subject</u> in <u>all</u> schools

• Sex Education will also be statutory in all secondary phase schools, and optional for primary phase schools (except where elements of this are in the curriculum already e.g. Science)

What is included in the new curriculum?

Health Education

Primary schools should cover:

- Mental wellbeing
- Internet safety and harms
- Physical health and fitness
- Healthy eating
- Drugs, alcohol and tobacco
- Health and prevention
- Basic first aid
- Changing adolescent body

What is included in the new curriculum?

Relationships Education

Primary schools should cover:

- Families and people who care for me
- Caring friendships
- Respectful relationships
- Online relationships
- Being safe
